


A **phonogram** is a letter or combination of letters that represent a sound. Words that have the same phonograms are referred to as **word families**.

Phonograms can have different sounds, even though it is the same letter combinations.

(ex: how, low)

Phonograms can appear at the beginning, middle or end of words. It is important that children learn phonograms, to become better readers and spellers.

Ex: **cow, how,** share the same **-ow** phonogram **boat, coat**, share the **-oa** phonogram
